This TeleWeb course is a balanced mix of theoretical aspects, practical examples, and hands-on activities. The speakers will discuss the origins, technical basis, limitations, and current uses of control banding. Current activities in developing and developed countries will be presented, along with a report from the National Control Banding Workshop. A case study will demonstrate the application of control banding concepts in controlling worker exposures to glutaraldehyde at the "expert advice" level of control. The selection of an appropriate level of controls will be demonstrated using the COSHH Essentials approach, and participants will have an opportunity to apply control-banding principles to real-world examples.

f. US Surgeon General Releases Advisory on Alcohol Use in Pregnancy

US Surgeon General Richard H. Carmona has warned pregnant women and women who may become pregnant to abstain from alcohol consumption in order to eliminate the chance of giving birth to a baby with any of the harmful effects of the Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD). FASD is the full spectrum of birth defects caused by prenatal alcohol exposure.

Dr. Carmona made this announcement prior to participating in BirthDay Live!, a 10-hour live television program on the Discovery Health Channel that shows childbirths from three locations across the country. This announcement and participation in the program are both part of Surgeon General Carmona's "The Year of the Healthy Child" agenda: a commitment to help improve the holistic health of children from pre-conception through the teen years.
